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DADE COUNTY COMMISSION
REGULAR MEETING
NOVEMBER 6, 2008

1 MR. BRANDON: I want to call the
2 meeting to order. As we always do, we'll have the
3 invocation and Pledge of Allegiance. I would like
4 to ask Former Commissioner John Deffenbaugh to lead
5 us, please.

6 (Thereupon, the invocation and
7 Pledge of Allegiance were given.)

8 MR. BRANDON: This is the regularly
9 scheduled meeting of the Dade County Commission
10 which takes place on the first Thursday of every
11 month. Proper notice of this meeting was given to
12 the legal organ of Dade County and has been posted
13 in the hallway of the Administration Building. I'll
14 call the roll and have it recorded by the clerk.
15 Mr. Lowery?

16 MR. LOWERY: Here.

17 MR. BRANDON: Ms. Moore?

18 MS. MOORE: Here.

19 MR. BRANDON: Mr. Young?

20 MR. YOUNG: Here.

21 MR. BRANDON: Mr. Pittman is absent.
22 He had to work tonight. The chair is present. We
23 have a forum and, therefore, a legal meeting.

24 The reading of the minutes of the
25 October 2008 regular meeting will not be required

1 since all Commissioners have been furnished copies
2 in advance. The minutes are public record and
3 available for review in the county executive's
4 office. The minutes are included in the consent
5 agenda as with a number of other items that we
6 discussed at the work session. I'll ask the clerk
7 to read off the items on the consent agenda at this
8 time.

9 MR. TOWNSEND: The regular agenda as
10 amended, the approval of previous minutes, the
11 approval of new employees, the appointment of
12 Ms. Sandra Pullen to the DFACS Board, the approval
13 of invoices as presented, approval of New Home and
14 North Dade Fire Departments for capital S.P.L.O.S.T
15 purchases, approval of proclamations for honor -- to
16 honor our local veterans during the month of
17 November and also a proclamation to recognize family
18 literacy during the month of November, approval of
19 the fiscal year 2009 agreement for the
20 transportation of the elderly nutrition program,
21 approval of employee handbook as amended, approval
22 of the resolution approving the debris management
23 plan for GEMA, approval of the first reading of the
24 proposed speed limit change to Burkhalter Gap after
25 an engineering and safety study is performed

1 reducing the speed limit to -- to 35 miles an hour,
2 then to 45 miles per hour and then ultimately to
3 55 miles an hour, approval of -- also to reduce the
4 speed limit on Morgan Road, to reduce it to 15 after
5 the safety study has been performed, engineering
6 safety study has been performed and that's it.

7 MR. BRANDON: These are the items on
8 the consent agenda. To approve the consent agenda
9 and the minutes of the last meeting, it requires a
10 vote. Do I have a motion that we approve the
11 consent agenda?

12 MR. YOUNG: I make a motion we approve
13 the consent agenda.

14 MR. BRANDON: I have a motion. Is
15 there a second?

16 MS. MOORE: Okay. I'll second the
17 motion.

18 MR. BRANDON: I have a motion and a
19 second. I'll call the roll. Ms. Moore?

20 MS. MOORE: Yes.

21 MR. BRANDON: Mr. Lowery?

22 MR. LOWERY: Yes.

23 MR. BRANDON: Mr. Young?

24 MR. YOUNG: Yes.

25 MR. BRANDON: The chair votes yes. The

1 consent agenda passes.

2 At this time we have the
3 administrative -- under administrative, we have
4 district commissioner reports, if there are any.

5 MR. LOWERY: I would just like to --

6 MR. BRANDON: The chair recognizes
7 Commissioner Lowery from District 1.

8 MR. LOWERY: Thank you, Mr. Chairman.
9 I would just like to say maybe at the next meeting,
10 the December meeting, it will be our final meeting.
11 We have three commissioners that will be leaving and
12 three new ones coming on. Maybe we could have
13 drinks, finger foods if everybody would like to
14 bring a little something. I'll bring some drinks.
15 If anybody would like to say thank you, welcome the
16 new ones in.

17 MR. BRANDON: Okay. Anybody else? I
18 have a -- the only thing I have is I want to thank
19 all the candidates. I mean, all the candidates, the
20 ones who were successful and the ones who were not,
21 for choosing to put themselves out and campaign as
22 hard as they did. I feel pretty good about the
23 elections here locally. There was not a lot of
24 acrimony. There was not a lot of mud slinging. It
25 was fairly reserved and that to me is the way you

1 should have an election. You should have an
2 election based on your ideas and not on
3 personalities or personal things or digging around,
4 you know. Somebody's voting record if they're an
5 incumbent is fair, but, you know, I think anything
6 past that, it just gets ugly and I want to
7 congratulate everybody who participated and who is
8 still participating even in the runoffs for the --
9 for what I think was a pretty successful local
10 election season.

11 Moving on into appearances -- well, let
12 me back up for a moment for those of you who weren't
13 here at the work session. At the work session, the
14 one thing that I think would be of importance to
15 everybody is we discussed the status of the
16 ambulance service for Dade County. We were notified
17 several weeks back -- Don, how long ago was that
18 meeting when Hutcheson came over, three weeks ago?
19 They came over and basically informed us that they
20 were getting out of the ambulance business for
21 business reasons because they were losing so much
22 money on the ambulance service and I understand
23 that.

24 We have -- since then, we have started
25 discussing what we're going to do with other

1 counties. We have a plan. It involves some
2 licensing that we need to do for the county because
3 we've been made aware that if you want to control
4 your own destiny as a county in Georgia, you need
5 to -- you need to own the license for ambulance
6 service in the county and then you could sub that
7 out to anybody you want, because if you don't have a
8 license, that means that whoever is providing the
9 service does, which puts you at their mercy and so
10 we need to get our own license. We've begun working
11 on that.

12 We also have a meeting tomorrow that
13 myself, Commissioner Lowery and Commissioner Elect
14 Rumley are going to. It's a strategy meeting with a
15 couple of other counties and we expect to come out
16 of there with a better idea of how we're going to
17 move forward. It's just strategy. We're not making
18 any decisions. There's nobody voting and it was a
19 meeting that we didn't call. We were invited to it.
20 So we expect to come out of there with more
21 information than we have now. And by going in and
22 bidding and requesting bids with two other counties,
23 we expect we'll get a much better deal than we would
24 if we went about it on our own because based on the
25 traffic and the number of calls that Alex tracks

1 through 911, we probably, if we went on it on our
2 own, would not get a sufficient response that we
3 could afford with just the number of calls we have
4 in Dade County. So it's incumbent upon us, if it
5 makes sense, to partner with the other counties and
6 that's what we'll find out tomorrow, if anybody is
7 interested in doing it.

8 Moving along to appearances, we have
9 the City of Trenton, official from the City of
10 Trenton. Is there someone here representing the
11 city? Do you want to represent the City,
12 Commissioner Elect Cervelli?

13 MR. CERVELLI: Mayor Harris had a wrist
14 operation, so he's not here tonight.

15 MR. BRANDON: It affected his vocal
16 cords?

17 MR. CERVELLI: No, no.

18 MR. BRANDON: I'll see him at church
19 and harass him about it on Sunday.

20 All right. We have Ms. Debbie Tinker
21 from the Chamber of Commerce. Is she here? We have
22 Mr. Allan Ward.

23 MR. WARD: Thank you for allowing us
24 the time. You've all been supplied with one of our
25 quarterly reports and I won't -- I won't go into it

1 and read the entire report because it's pretty
2 lengthy. The quarterly report is quite lengthy and
3 I won't read it, but actually we should because it
4 takes away a lot from the Chamber when we don't.
5 There's a lot of pages here and on these pages,
6 there are a lot of functions that have taken place
7 and a lot of things that Ms. Tinker, myself and the
8 other volunteers at the Dade County Chamber of
9 Commerce have taken place in and there are lots more
10 to come.

11 I know Mr. Brandon wants an update on
12 the Georgia Work Ready Program. We are -- there's
13 going to be a meeting and I'll read you this letter.
14 It's short and sweet. We can no longer afford to
15 graduate high school students who are not ready for
16 college or the workplace. In the state of Georgia,
17 we have a rigorous curriculum which sets high
18 expectations for our students. We need to prepare
19 them for the best academic education that we can,
20 but we also need to prepare them to be honest,
21 diligent workers seeking jobs where they can
22 demonstrate their skills and opportunities for
23 career change and advancement.

24 I'll skip down. On November 10th of
25 2008, at Dade County High School, there will be a

1 meeting of the Georgia Work Ready Program with Dade
2 County High School and Mr. Al Hutchens who heads
3 that program up. This is a program that Dade County
4 needs desperately and we would like your support on
5 it. So if any of you can make this meeting, we
6 would love for you to be there.

7 The Dade County Chamber of Commerce is
8 involved in local, regional and state organizations
9 and are planning a resource fair for displaced
10 workers to be held at the American Legion on
11 November 17th from 2:00 until 8:00 p.m. There will
12 be information on various services, how to access
13 services and which agencies to seek out in the next
14 months as Shaw transitions out of Dade County.

15 We've been in numerous meetings with
16 Mr. Cervelli and the Department of Labor and several
17 other organizations to put this fair together and
18 basically it's all the people that these people will
19 need to know to get done what they need to do to
20 make it until they get another job and hopefully we
21 can fill that slot soon with new business coming to
22 this county. That's what we're striving for.

23 The Chamber of Commerce has been
24 working with Al Abernathy of the Georgia Department
25 of Labor to organize for the workers from Shaw to

1 use the American Legion in groups of 30 to 40 over a
2 period of three days, December 10th through the
3 12th, to file their unemployment and will furnish
4 bags for unemployed with resource information. The
5 Chamber will have representatives from United Way of
6 Chattanooga's 211 service to speak at a business
7 luncheon open to the community on November 21st at
8 Randy's Restaurant. The service of the United Way
9 will be working closely with organizations and the
10 Dade County Chamber to supply information on where
11 they can find help with local services. There's a
12 lot of work that went into this, guys. A lot of
13 meetings have been held to make sure that we get all
14 of the right people together for these folks to draw
15 from.

16 I would like to remind everyone of the
17 Dade County Christmas parade this year. The theme
18 is let it snow, let it snow, let it snow.
19 Registration forms can be picked up at the Chamber
20 or by calling the Chamber. Also, the Trenton DDA is
21 asking the stores to decorate their fronts this year
22 and we will be decorating the town square. I guess
23 I could go ahead and do this announcement for the
24 DDA, right, Peter? The Downtown Development
25 Authority also in conjunction with the Chamber of

1 Commerce has moved Christmas in the Park to the
2 courthouse square here. They're going to decorate
3 the entire square, but -- and like I say, you guys
4 have what we have done over the past quarter, but
5 now we ask for your prayers for finding jobs for
6 these people from Shaw. We need all the help we can
7 get. Thank you very much. Mr. Cervelli?

8 MR. CERVELLI: Just to add to what you
9 said. It's actually for anybody, not just Shaw
10 workers.

11 MR. WARD: Not just Shaw.

12 MR. CERVELLI: Anybody who needs help
13 in relocating or transitioning to a new job or
14 wanting to get educated. It's not just getting a
15 job. It will be any one of those services including
16 continuing education. It's not just Dade County.
17 It's for Alabama and Tennessee workers as well and
18 the United Way 211 hotline, and it's a hotline, will
19 be the ongoing support. So anytime you have any
20 questions about anything that you might need, local
21 information is being provided to the United Way
22 hotline 211, so they'll have information regarding
23 all the state agencies and federal, but also what's
24 available here in Dade County. You can call them
25 and ask, 211. So if you ever have any questions,

1 you can always call the Chamber. They'll get you to
2 the right place, but that hotline is available now
3 and it's for anybody.

4 MR. WARD: And don't forget
5 November 10th from 11:30 to 1:00 at the high
6 school, the Georgia Work Ready Program. We'll have
7 a meeting there. Thank you very much.

8 MR. BRANDON: I want to thank the
9 Chamber for doing this.

10 MR. WARD: The packets are back here on
11 the desk if anyone wants one.

12 MR. BRANDON: Yeah. I want to thank
13 the Chamber for doing this. We were contacted the
14 day Shaw called us and told us they were leaving, we
15 contacted the RDC and I'm assuming that you're
16 working with the folks from the RDC to do this.
17 They are a great resource for us and we get -- we
18 really get our money's worth from them for our dues
19 to the RDC because they can line up the Department
20 of Labor to come in to counsel people and they can
21 bring a lot of resources to bear that we wouldn't
22 ordinarily have and I want to thank the Chamber for
23 being the intermediary on that.

24 I would also remind you, if you weren't
25 here for the work session, don't forget about the

1 Veteran's Day parade on Saturday. It should be a
2 pretty good event as always and I would ask you to
3 come to that. There will also be a ceremony on the
4 square on Veteran's Day on the 11th at 11:00 a.m.
5 I didn't plan it, so I didn't -- somebody else in
6 the post down there planned it, so I don't know
7 exactly what the plan is, but please come out and
8 join us if you can.

9 Moving on to our next appearance, we
10 have Ms. Connie Therrien discussing as a citizen and
11 not as a reporter at this time to discuss walking
12 dogs in the county park.

13 MS. THERRIEN: Most -- thank you for
14 giving me this opportunity as a citizen and I am
15 totally not with the paper at this time.

16 My dog, most of you have seen you
17 walking through here today. She is a certified
18 therapy dog. She can go to, well, TC Thompson or to
19 Erlanger. There's absolutely wonderful things that
20 they're doing now even with autistic children and
21 dogs. She can sit as a reading dog, so she's got a
22 lot of opportunities there, but the purpose --

23 MR. BRANDON: The dog can read?

24 MS. THERRIEN: Pardon?

25 MR. BRANDON: She can read?

1 MS. THERRIEN: Sure.

2 MR. BRANDON: Too bad Ed Sullivan is
3 not on the air anymore. I'm just kidding. Go
4 ahead.

5 MS. THERRIEN: That's okay. These
6 therapy dogs are used solely for emotional therapy
7 in situations where people might not have their own
8 animals and might miss having the comfort or
9 annoyance of a dog or cat with them, but she has
10 been certified. There's a couple of teams here.
11 Connie Jahr, who is a trainer down in Rising Fawn,
12 also has a dog that she's got certified and we're
13 available. Penny and I are going to the Senior
14 Center and to Head Start a week from Friday. So
15 we're starting around now.

16 But walking dogs in the county park, I
17 guess the question would be to perhaps the county
18 attorney, Mr. Rogers, are the signs there at the
19 county parks that say no dogs allowed, does that
20 mean on the walking track also, because I have been
21 confronted and told that you're not supposed to have
22 dogs there walking?

23 MR. ROGERS: I have never looked at the
24 issue, but I'll be happy to do that.

25 MS. THERRIEN: Because that might just

1 wipe out what I'm going to ask. I would ask that
2 that be waived. And I understand you don't want the
3 dogs at the concession stand. You don't want the
4 dogs on those ball fields. I understand that. But
5 on the track itself. Walking is the best exercise
6 anyone can have. Walking a dog for some people is
7 good therapy along with good exercise. So I would
8 ask that the Commission waive that for a period of
9 three months to see if this works out. And I know
10 there's some questions that people might have.

11 We would ask that if you're going to
12 walk your dog, that it's a nonaggressive dog. It
13 doesn't have to have formal training, but it has to
14 be nonaggressive and that you clean up after your
15 dogs and I'm willing to give and stick out there
16 some little doggy cleanup bags. These are
17 biodegradable. They go into the regular trash and
18 people can clean up after their dogs. I thought to
19 mount these with a little clean up sign, doggy clean
20 up sign, on the back of the emergency -- police and
21 emergency vehicle sign that's there, so it would be
22 on the opposite side of the sign sort of facing the
23 walkway. And I would be willing to put this up
24 initially and then perhaps the animal board or DART
25 could sponsor it in the long run. It wouldn't be

1 any cost to the County.

2 Most dog owners, of course, they keep
3 their own stuff. If I have my dog with me, we've
4 got clean up bags in the car or I might even have
5 one in my pocket, but I would just ask that if the
6 Commission were to waive that for a period of time
7 and try it and see. People with vicious or
8 aggressive dogs don't normally walk their dog and
9 they sure don't walk them in a public place if they
10 do, so I don't think we'd have that to be concerned
11 with.

12 I would like to -- if the Commission
13 would waive that for a certain period of time, I
14 would like to have maybe a quick meeting to see if
15 it would be okay to set up an -- advertise sort of
16 like a kickoff walk where people could come one
17 Saturday morning and anyone show up that had a dog
18 and maybe we could evaluate to see if those dogs
19 could get along with people and with other dogs and
20 then walk. So I ask that that be done.

21 MR. LOWERY: The only thing I didn't
22 hear was do they need to be on a leash?

23 MS. THERRIEN: Always. I did have four
24 things that -- they would always be on a leash, that
25 they would be nonaggressive, that people would clean

1 up after them and that we would supply some clean up
2 bags in case people didn't bring their own.

3 MR. BRANDON: Okay. We didn't put this
4 on the agenda tonight to make a decision on this, so
5 we will add it to the next work session and discuss
6 it then.

7 MS. THERRIEN: Okay. That sounds good
8 and hopefully maybe Mr. Rogers could have some
9 information by then. Thank you.

10 MR. BRANDON: We're up to item number
11 four, which is fiscal matters. We'll ask the county
12 clerk to read the financial report:

13 MR. TOWNSEND: As of October 31st, the
14 drug education fund has a balance of 37,894; federal
15 asset fund, 2,517; special sheriff's fund, 35,996;
16 jail fund, 29,686; juvenile services fund, 13,135;
17 victim assistance fund, 2,311; payroll account
18 \$91,247; general fund, 250,312; and then under the
19 2004 S.P.L.O.S.T we added a 2009 block there for the
20 Commissioners to review the new names that we --
21 2009 S.P.L.O.S.T we do have bonded, namely the
22 construction account \$3,219,634 and proceeds account
23 has a balance of \$142,579.

24 Above there is the current principal
25 and interest and capital bond fund accounts. As you

1 see listed, the principal and interest is 666,463;
2 principal and interest investments at 198,000 for a
3 total -- well, P&I debt service account, 25,643 for
4 a total principal and interest fund balance of
5 890,107.

6 The bottom is the new listing for fire
7 departments. The top three are listed for
8 S.P.L.O.S.T leases. The bottom four are for fire
9 departments with S.P.L.O.S.T bonds, so at this time
10 we have no money spent, but we have had some things
11 approved tonight, so that could change next time.

12 Moving on to page two, the active
13 certificates of deposit and redeemed certificates of
14 deposit. Page three is renewed certificates of
15 deposit and then page four is the general fund
16 revenue and expenses by department names and you
17 could see that with 83 -- as of October 31st with
18 83.33 percent of the year complete, revenues
19 attained at this point was 77.98 percent, which is a
20 little down there. Expenses attained, however, are
21 also down, 75.2 percent. So there's less expense --
22 even though there's less revenue, there's less
23 expense. So revenue less expenses for October equal
24 \$367,267. Revenues less expenses year-to-date
25 equals \$321,765.

1 Still are looking at the -- look at the
2 top there in revenues to governmental financial
3 administration, you see year-to-date that is short
4 335,000 and 300,000 of that is from the local option
5 sales tax. So that's been pretty rough on local
6 option sales tax.

7 MR. BRANDON: Still with that, we're
8 only short \$35,000, \$35,777 for the year. So that's
9 very good.

10 MR. TOWNSEND: Right.

11 MR. LOWERY: S.P.L.O.S.T payment was
12 217 this month; is that right?

13 MR. TOWNSEND: For the principal and
14 interest -- I'm sorry. The bond payment?

15 MR. LOWERY: No, S.P.L.O.S.T
16 collections.

17 MR. TOWNSEND: Oh, yes. If you look --

18 MR. LOWERY: 217.

19 MR. TOWNSEND: -- on there, it was
20 \$217,323 collected for the month of October. The
21 report in between is the project variance report
22 breaking everything out according to the different
23 accounts listed and then towards the back, you see a
24 project -- sorry, budget versus actual report.

25 MR. BRANDON: Good enough. Thank you,

1 Don.

2 MR. LOWERY: One more question.

3 Everyone is pointing at me up here and pointing at
4 that screen. When are we going to get the screen
5 working?

6 MR. TOWNSEND: It is working. They
7 were attempting to use it, I believe, election night
8 and it was --

9 MR. LOWERY: Didn't work then either.

10 MR. BRANDON: Well, it does work, but
11 the problem is if you don't have the software to be
12 able to magnify what you have on the screen, unless
13 you're sitting on the first three or four rows, it's
14 not going to work. It doesn't do you any good. So
15 unless somebody is going to sit there and scroll
16 over these reports like we've done here, you
17 couldn't see it where Buddy is sitting here.

18 MR. LOWERY: So we wasted our money
19 buying it?

20 MR. TOWNSEND: No. I believe we can
21 still use it. I just don't have a laptop out here
22 to be able to use it. Alex Case has offered to give
23 us -- or to allow me to use his laptop, but right
24 now we've been watching the budget and did not want
25 to spend the money on a laptop.

1 MR. BRANDON: I don't recall voting on
2 buying it anyway, but that's all right.

3 Moving onto legal matters, I'll ask the
4 county attorney if there are any legal matters
5 outstanding.

6 MR. ROGERS: No, no, there are not.

7 MR. BRANDON: I knew you were going to
8 say that. That's right. I guess we're still
9 waiting for --

10 MR. LOWERY: Same question you asked.

11 MR. BRANDON: Onto new business, we
12 have one item on new business, which is the issue of
13 whether or not we need to pave the locations where
14 we used to have some of the cans sitting around the
15 county and at this time, I would ask if there is a
16 motion on the floor to do that.

17 MS. MOORE: I will make a motion that
18 we go back and repair West Brow and North Dade as
19 they were before they were destroyed.

20 MR. BRANDON: We have a motion by
21 Ms. Moore. Is there a second?

22 MR. LOWERY: I'll second it for
23 discussion.

24 MR. BRANDON: We have a motion and a
25 second. We'll open it for discussion. I'll turn it

1 over first to Commissioner Lowery.

2 MR. LOWERY: I made a misstatement in
3 the meeting. I said that the S&L Body Shop had been
4 paved before they went in there and my daddy told me
5 he thinks the County paved that, so we'll be in the
6 same shoes as the West Brow Community Center.

7 MR. ROGERS: Mr. Chairman, over the
8 break I thought about that as well and if we paved
9 that in the way of compensation for them allowing us
10 to use their property, then we can't tear up what we
11 offered to them as a benefit. Now, if we paved it
12 as -- in error and it should not have been paved,
13 then we're obligated only to return it to where it
14 was before the error was made.

15 MR. BRANDON: I was notified at the
16 break by someone, who will remain nameless, that the
17 parking lot was originally paved because as sole
18 commissioners, you could do such things and people
19 would vote for you. So that was not the case
20 because it was -- if it was paved for that reason, I
21 don't see that we have an obligation to repave a
22 parking lot that happened to have a dumpster in it
23 that is no longer there. There is no compelling
24 reason to spend County money for the benefit of one
25 community center or one private property anywhere to

1 repave a parking lot or part of a parking lot that
2 was paved by somebody else to get votes originally.
3 Is there any other discussion? Hearing no
4 discussion, we'll call the vote. Ms. Moore?

5 MS. MOORE: Yes.

6 MR. BRANDON: Mr. Lowery?

7 MR. LOWERY: I would like to have the
8 question restated to leave North Dade out of it,
9 North Dade Body Shop out of it.

10 MR. BRANDON: Okay. So the motion --
11 will you accept the change to the -- well,
12 Commissioner Lowery rescinded his change. So the
13 motion is to pave the area out at the West Brow
14 Community Center where the can used to be. So we
15 have a motion and a second. I'll call the roll.
16 Ms. Moore?

17 MS. MOORE: Yes.

18 MR. BRANDON: Mr. Lowery?

19 MR. LOWERY: Yes.

20 MR. BRANDON: Mr. Young?

21 MR. YOUNG: No.

22 MR. BRANDON: And the chair votes no.
23 The motion fails.

24 We're up to citizen participation.
25 Does anyone wish to address their fellow citizens?

1 Seeing no hands and there being no executive session
2 scheduled and there being no further business before
3 this session of the Dade County Commission, we stand
4 adjourned until December. Thank you.
