DADE COUNTY COMMISSION
REGULAR MEETING
AUGUST 2011

1 MR. RUMLEY: Okay. Let's go ahead and
2 call this meeting to order. I appreciate all of you
3 staying here with us and attending the work session
4 and also the meeting. We already said our
5 invocation and Pledge of Allegiance. I felt that
6 was the right thing to do since we had a good crowd
7 here at the work session because most of the time
8 after the work session is over, everybody clears the
9 room.

10 This is a regularly-scheduled meeting
11 of the Dade County Commission which takes place at
12 the same time on the first Thursday of every month.
13 Proper notice of this meeting was given in the legal
14 organ of Dade County and has been posted in the
15 hallway of the Administration Building. At this
16 time I need a roll call. Mr. Cervelli?

17 MR. CERVELLI: Here.

18 MR. RUMLEY: Mr. Goff?

19 MR. GOFF: Here.

20 MR. RUMLEY: Mr. Pittman?

21 MR. PITTMAN: Here.

22 MR. RUMLEY: Mr. Smith?

23 MR. SMITH: Here.

24 MR. RUMLEY: Chair is present.

25 Mitchell, we'll start with you on the committee

1 reports.

2 MR. SMITH: Okay. Down at the transfer
3 station, normally it's running anywhere in the
4 twenties up to thirty tons a day. The garbage is on
5 the rise according to Mr. Massengale. It's running
6 around forty tons a day going through the transfer
7 station. There's still a lot of cleanup in
8 households going on in the county. To me it's
9 recovering partly because of that. We're alive and
10 well, if you want to put it that way. On the up
11 side, too, of that, recycling is on the increase as
12 far as the cost. Cardboard was in the \$40 a ton.
13 It's up to \$175 a ton. So if you've got cardboard,
14 you may not want Billy to have it. You may want to
15 hold onto it and haul it off. There's some pluses
16 and minuses here. That's all I have.

17 MR. RUMLEY: Scottie?

18 MR. PITTMAN: Well, I was going to
19 report on mine and your meeting with our different
20 groups on Sand Mountain, but I think everybody knows
21 pretty much what's going on from the last thirty
22 minutes or so. Again, you know, my heart goes out
23 to these people. They've put money. They've put
24 time in their houses and their subdivisions and
25 Robin is going to look at a couple more different

1 angles of this. Each of you guys, if anyone could
2 come up with any help for these people. If legal
3 avenue is the course they decide they need to go,
4 then I wish them the best on that, too. That's
5 really all I've got tonight.

6 MR. RUMLEY: Robert?

7 MR. GOFF: First of all, I agree with
8 Mr. Pittman on that very issue, but as far as the
9 south end of the county, the parks and recreation,
10 you may have gone by and noticed some new building
11 going on down there. It's yet another restroom on
12 the north side because everything is so spread out
13 down there, but what I do want to do is publicly
14 thank the recreation, rec league because they have
15 carried most of the cost of that new facility down
16 there. It's really going to help out. For any
17 reason if you're walking or whatever, it's just --
18 it just makes it a little more user friendly, I
19 suppose, so I thank the rec league for doing that.

20 Also, we went over the head count. We
21 did have a person resign and he was over our parks,
22 Jason Monday who had been down there for a pretty
23 good little while and he has resigned and we now
24 have hired Stacy Stephens. So we have somebody kind
25 of learning the ropes down there, but I assure you

1 that things will go on as summer comes along, summer
2 and the fall as a lot of people begin to use that
3 facility down there. So we just look forward to
4 those kinds of things. That's all I've got.

5 MR. RUMLEY: Peter Cervelli?

6 MR. CERVELLI: Thank you. Just quick
7 words on the roads and the cleanup. You know, it's
8 officially the last tornado damage -- legitimate
9 material should have been pushed to the road earlier
10 this month. These cleanups have gone well. Ted
11 will talk a little bit more about this, but the FEMA
12 billing process is going badly, but we'll hear more
13 about that.

14 Also, there's going to be some paving
15 of roads taking place shortly that the State has
16 promised to do, so we'll see some roads being paved
17 that need to be paved including the top of
18 Burkhalter Gap, which thank goodness. It's about
19 time. They're supposed to do it, start this month
20 and if they don't start, there's apparently
21 penalties to the paving company. So I look forward
22 to that being done.

23 We'll get to the finance part of the
24 story. In July, our check from the State for sales
25 tax was about \$183,000. That's versus about 150,000

1 the same month last year and that's about a
2 21 percent improvement over the last year and it's
3 about six percent more than just June. And quite
4 frankly, I haven't seen a number that high since
5 2009. And if I looked at the trend, I would say our
6 sales tax collections are going up and they are. I
7 hope it stays. We need the money and you'll hear
8 more about that shortly, but if you've seen the
9 market today and the economy, people talk about how
10 bad the situation is. I don't think we're going to
11 count on us being sales tax rich as a result of good
12 sales tax collections. They've been good and I'm
13 grateful for that.

14 And our S.P.L.O.S.T revenues are up
15 accordingly as well. We collected about \$229,000 in
16 S.P.L.O.S.T and since we reforecasted a lower number
17 in terms of what our inspections were for
18 S.P.L.O.S.T, about 185,000 a month, that's a good
19 plus, too. I'm pleased with that. We should all be
20 pleased, but I hope that's a trend, but I'm not
21 going to bank on it and I don't think any of us
22 should.

23 In terms of closing out the budget for
24 last year, we closed the books officially June 30th.
25 As Don said, we can't officially do a budget

1 amendment because there are some things that need to
 2 be posted and corrected that aren't in there, but we
 3 have booked the FEMA expenses into the budget as
 4 basically a receivable that the federal government
 5 and the state governments owe us and that does not
 6 mean we have cash, however. It just means we've
 7 done what the accounting rules say, accounted for
 8 that money.

9 And so if you take a look at the budget
 10 numbers, it looks like our revenue is 131 percent of
 11 what we projected for last year and expenses are at
 12 127 percent of what we projected and that's true
 13 because we now have included those tornado related
 14 expenses and I hope Ted does talk about where we
 15 stand in trying to collect our money that we
 16 submitted bills for in regard to the tornado. So
 17 we'll talk more about that next month when the books
 18 are actually closed.

19 Probably the more important issue is
 20 this year's budget, which started in July. We've
 21 determined as a result of all the tornado related
 22 expenses, the digest being lower, that we need to go
 23 back and lower the budget across the board for the
 24 county, somewhere between six and a half and
 25 seven percent. And that's going to happen.

1 We talked with the sheriff yesterday.
2 He was the first person we wanted to inform of this
3 because he has one of the biggest -- our public
4 safety budget is clearly one of the biggest items
5 and I have to congratulate the sheriff on his
6 understanding and willing to execute what needs to
7 be done to taxpayers of this county and so our
8 public safety and the sheriff is leading the way and
9 we will be talking with every department that this
10 budget will be cut and we expect that to happen
11 quickly. That's all I have to say.

12 MR. RUMLEY: Thank you, Peter. What
13 we're actually asking our elected officials and each
14 department to do is it averages out to about a
15 6.7 percent cut overall and like Peter said, the
16 sheriff is the first department we've talked to, but
17 what we're asking them, it's just kind of up to
18 them. They're the leaders of that department.
19 They're the decision makers and whether they do it
20 in furloughs or however, it doesn't matter to us as
21 long as they can shave that seven percent off. Like
22 Peter said, it's not something we're talking about.
23 We'll meet in the next couple of weeks, myself and
24 Don and Peter also with every department head and
25 that's what we're laying out to them.

1 That's not something they can do in a
2 week, but as long as they come in toward the end of
3 the year with that figure, that's what we're asking.

4 MR. CERVELLI: The good part, if you
5 want to think of it as good, we have 11 months of
6 the year to manage this problem and that's why we
7 want to get it done early.

8 MR. RUMLEY: Because even in a
9 business, you don't wait until you get to the end of
10 your period there and you're in a bind, you go back
11 and try to start cutting. That way you've got a
12 full year, 11 months to do this.

13 FEMA, you know, the cleanup ended.
14 Actually, they're winding up the pickup tomorrow.
15 The last day to push up was Monday. That's went
16 pretty smooth. We've got a few piles left for
17 tomorrow, but the big issue with FEMA is actually
18 collecting the money that's owed to Dade County.
19 The project worksheets we've turned in, they're
20 really dragging their feet on these things. We've
21 only had two checks come in. One was for 112,000
22 and the other was like 212, but they're out there.
23 There's like \$2 million out there, 2.2 million.

24 I've called them every day this week.
25 I've met with these people and they keep saying,

1 well, it's in Washington and they're turning it
2 around as quickly as they can, but they've been
3 telling us this now for two solid months. We
4 actually started turning PWS in, project worksheets
5 in two months ago. It's not a matter of whether
6 we're going to get the money. It's a matter of them
7 just dragging their feet. We've called our
8 congressman and they're helping us with it, and our
9 senators, but hopefully, you know, from the phone
10 call today, hopefully by Tuesday or Wednesday of
11 this next week, we'll at least have another couple
12 of checks coming in. The rest of them are large,
13 large checks. So I'll keep the press, keep Evan and
14 Eddie advised on that. So we're hoping for the best
15 on that.

16 The other thing that hit actually this
17 month, that kind of came in was this -- the
18 landfill, EPD on our landfill over here. We've been
19 trying to close this landfill for years, I mean
20 totally close it. It's costing us close to 100,000
21 a year, 86,000 a year for a company to go out and
22 pull samples to tell us whether there's anything in
23 the soil that's putting any contaminants in the soil
24 and we've tried to -- we went to Atlanta and talked
25 to EPD last year. They did help us cut some of the

1 costs. We've been having to do monitoring quarterly
2 and they did cut that down to actually twice a year.
3 That saved us about 20,000, 22,000, but now they've
4 come back and they're wanting another well drilled,
5 which that's another 20, 22,000 to actually do
6 comparative tests to the wells that are existing.
7 You know, it doesn't sound like a big deal, but it's
8 costing us that much every month, every year, so
9 there's got to be an end to it.

10 We've spent a lot of time in the last
11 year in Atlanta and back. I've been on the phone
12 constantly with them this week trying to get -- if
13 we drill the well, you know, we'll be able to close
14 it in a year. As long as we've got just a trace of
15 the zinc and the mercury there in one of the wells,
16 they're not going to let us close it. Who knows how
17 long. They can't really say. The actual parts per
18 million has gone down every six months. So
19 hopefully, you know, in another year or so we'll be
20 able to get out of the landfill business.

21 Also, let me see here. Peter commented
22 on the budget. I did comment on that. The railroad
23 blocking, we did pass an ordinance a couple of
24 meetings ago pertaining to the railroad blocking
25 crossings here in Trenton and in Dade County. We've

1 still had some problems. Peter called me the other
2 day. We had another problem the week before that.
3 I have contacted the railroad and I'm trying to get
4 a meeting set up with them hopefully tomorrow, maybe
5 next week to come up and let them know just how
6 serious this is. They've already -- they've already
7 been -- I've already sent a copy of the notice to
8 Attalla, which they're supposed to have forwarded it
9 onto Virginia, to Roanoke, but that's something
10 that's got -- it's got to be serious because the
11 railroad -- the crossings are blocking. It's not
12 only slowing our trucks in and out of our industrial
13 park, but there's a worry there about the ambulance,
14 you know, if a person had a heart attack, getting in
15 and out. To a lot of people that might not sound
16 serious, but it is. It can be a very serious
17 problem and hopefully we can handle that by meeting
18 with the railroad and explaining, you know -- and I
19 don't know. I know the railroad -- I had a guy tell
20 me today -- you know, of course, Scottie works for
21 the railroad. They're kind of their own government
22 sometimes and they're hard to deal with. We're
23 going to make our stand on that.

24 Any of y'all got anything else you want
25 to add?

1 MR. PITTMAN: Yeah, I do have one
2 thing. My wife's birthday is Saturday, so I want to
3 go ahead and wish her a happy birthday.

4 MR. GOFF: Hey, we had one today, too.

5 MR. RUMLEY: Oh, yeah. Peter Cervelli.
6 Sorry, Peter.

7 MR. CERVELLI: That's quite all right.
8 President Obama and I both have birthdays today and
9 I'm expecting his call shortly.

10 MR. RUMLEY: Is today his birthday?

11 MR. CERVELLI: Yeah.

12 MR. RUMLEY: Okay. Debbie, do you have
13 anything you want to talk about tonight with our
14 Chamber?

15 MS. TINKER: Just a little bit. I
16 don't know how many business owners are here in the
17 room, but you may have received a call from the
18 Chamber recently or you will be. Approximately a
19 year ago Commissioner Cervelli working with the City
20 and County was able to get a designation down
21 Highway 11 to bring in good tax incentives for
22 industrial businesses. He is now working on an
23 opportunity zoned area that will also include retail
24 businesses and the Chamber is trying to help him
25 with collecting the data of this information and

1 since our disasters, a lot of our businesses have
2 moved. Maybe they've relocated to their homes,
3 maybe they're not rebuilding and this is one of the
4 reasons for the call from the Chamber is to find out
5 where our businesses are. When people ask how many
6 were impacted, without the county licensing, it's
7 very hard to say was this business on Sand Mountain
8 or whatever. So we're trying to help collect that
9 data and other data that will help get those
10 incentives and we're very appreciative of that.

11 We're also updating data for the
12 Chamber's website where you'll know which businesses
13 are where. We do promote the Chamber's businesses
14 and we have some very good incentives for them, but
15 we're not here just for them. We do promote our
16 other businesses. We will be glad to do your ribbon
17 cuttings, news articles to let people know where you
18 are because we want everything to get back as close
19 to normal as it was.

20 We will be working to gather data to
21 send out packets to recruit new businesses here, to
22 replace those that won't be rebuilding and also to
23 help those that are here. I know that FEMA has run
24 out on your structural damage, I believe, on
25 businesses and everything, but until January, you

1 can get economic impact help and we do have
2 information on that at the Chamber and we will be
3 glad to work with the Small Business Development
4 Association and do anything we can.

5 Next, our Chamber banquet that was
6 supposed to be the weekend of the tornadoes has been
7 rescheduled. It's September 17th and it will be
8 at the Civic Center still at 6:00 p.m. Anyone that
9 bought tickets, we hope to see you there and we are
10 still selling tickets again. Also, we're doing a
11 fundraiser for a -- we're preselling pork butt
12 barbecue and the whole pork butt is \$25 each and
13 that's eight pounds precooked weight and then we
14 will also have the plates down at R-Haven during the
15 Kiwanis Duck Race and so we're taking preorders
16 until September 2nd and then it can be picked up on
17 September 10th. Thank you.

18 MR. RUMLEY: Any questions for Debbie?

19 MR. CERVELLI: On the opportunity zones
20 that she was talking about, that is only if the
21 State agrees and it's going to be a City project,
22 not a County project and the City Commission has to
23 agree as well. So we're in very early preliminary
24 stages for opportunities for tax credits.

25 MR. RUMLEY: Okay. Don, Mr. Townsend,

1 give us our monthly financial report, please.

2 MR. TOWNSEND: As of July 31st, the
3 General Fund had a balance of \$408,510; Federal
4 Asset Fund, U.S. Treasury, \$285; Sheriff's Special
5 Fund, \$1,483; Drug Abuse Education Fund, 87,547;
6 Supplemental Juvenile Services Fund, 19,127; Victim
7 Assistance Fund, \$1,098; Jail Fund, \$9,231; Federal
8 Assets Fund, Department of Justice, \$3,660. Payroll
9 account, \$55,296. The 2004 S.P.L.O.S.T has a
10 balance of \$146,538. Under the new S.P.L.O.S.T
11 projects account has a balance of \$211,208.
12 Proceeds account, \$1,274,357. Construction account,
13 \$19,063.

14 I would point out -- I'm getting ready
15 to tell you how bad we are in the General Fund. It
16 sounds like we're rich in the proceeds account, but
17 we have a bond payment coming up, so everyone's eyes
18 get really big when they see one million anything in
19 an account, but that's getting ready to go bye-bye.
20 So I just wanted to make y'all aware of that when we
21 make that bond payment.

22 As of June 30th, as Commissioner
23 Cervelli reported, revenues -- these are the
24 adjusted numbers. These are numbers I'm getting
25 ready to give you that include accounts receivable

1 and that means this is what we expect as of June 30
2 to have collected. Revenues less expenses for June
3 will be \$1,218,737.55. Revenues less expenses
4 year-to-date would be short by \$25,192.09. That
5 sounds wonderful, however, actual -- and I just want
6 to give you this because the raw numbers are
7 revenues less expenses for June is short \$1,378,912
8 and revenues less expenses year-to-date is short
9 \$2,622,842. That's a big difference. And the
10 reason behind that is we are expecting revenues from
11 FEMA and GEMA combined, which I think all the funds
12 ultimately come from GEMA.

13 For the Sheriff's Department, those
14 moneys total \$18,625.45. Emergency Management
15 Association, \$20,787.22. And for Public Works,
16 \$2,558,237.34. As far as expenses go, for June
17 alone June was one million -- in Public Works, this
18 is hard to believe, \$1,124,301.59. The reason
19 that's so high is the cleanup. We received several
20 bills from DTS and those bills were all paid.

21 MR. CERVELLI: Just to be clear --

22 MR. RUMLEY: DTS is our cleanup people.

23 MR. TOWNSEND: DTS is for Daniels Tree
24 Service. It's the contractor that was awarded the
25 bid that has cleaned up our rights of County, City

1 and now State rights of way throughout Dade County.

2 MR. CERVELLI: And also just to be
3 clear, we've got to pay the bill before we get any
4 money back, so we just can't wait and say when we
5 get it, we'll pay you. The law says you've got to
6 pay them, so we have a major cash flow problem here
7 as you're hearing. We've paid out a lot of money
8 expecting it to come back to us and not all of it,
9 but so we're up front with the cash and waiting for
10 the check on the back end.

11 MR. RUMLEY: They pay on canceled
12 checks is what Peter is saying.

13 MR. TOWNSEND: So we have to pay, you
14 know, \$1,256,174.75, but we can't pay that in one
15 lump sum, so we have to pay small increments and get
16 paid back in small increments and we have to do that
17 over a period of time. So until that happens, our
18 general fund is very, very short. And even after
19 which, it's still going to be somewhat short because
20 these are only paid at 85 percent right now; is that
21 correct? We still have 15 percent. Of that
22 15 percent, the City will pay 20 percent of one of
23 these project worksheets, which is the larger one,
24 and we are responsible for -- the County is
25 responsible for 80 percent of that total. Expenses

1 year-to-date -- well, it's the same amount for
2 public works \$1,256,174.75 and so I wanted to
3 clarify that.

4 When you look at the raw numbers,
5 budget attained, of course, is 100 percent. This is
6 our final 12 months of the year, revenues attained
7 is actually 101.26 percent. Expenses is
8 127.52 percent. So we have received some short-term
9 financing from the bank, although even that is dried
10 up because, again, we have to wait for them to
11 release the funds and that one project worksheet is
12 very large. It's over \$2.5 million.

13 MR. RUMLEY: Well, the next draw will
14 be 1.2 million, the check, you know. It should have
15 been here this week. FEMA is really -- it's really
16 surprised me working with FEMA. This is --
17 especially this payback as far as the canceled
18 check. That was never -- that was asked upfront.
19 It was never disclosed to us until right here
20 halfway through this thing and you've got a county
21 like Catoosa County, they didn't have a problem.
22 They've got \$5 million -- three and a half,
23 \$4 million in their rainy day fund is what they call
24 it, but they're the same way. They're waiting on
25 their money just like we are, but financially they

1 had money, you know, to actually recoup on it some.

2 But we feel -- like we said, we know
3 the money is coming, but FEMA, it was an experience
4 working with them. I'm sorry. I didn't mean to
5 interrupt you. The more you talk, it really gets my
6 blood pressure up because I'm on the phone with
7 these people every day.

8 MR. TOWNSEND: Someone asked me
9 sometime this week, why we don't use the 1.2 million
10 in our S.P.L.O.S.T. We cannot do that. It's
11 illegal for us to do that because that's a general
12 fund expense.

13 MR. CERVELLI: Unlike the federal
14 government which can borrow from Social Security, we
15 can't do that.

16 MR. TOWNSEND: Right. If we were a
17 federal entity, we could just increase the debt and
18 print some more money, but unfortunately our
19 printing press is broke.

20 The Local Option Sales Tax for July
21 came in at \$182,959.14 and the Special Purpose Local
22 Option Sales Tax was collected at \$228,698.20. So
23 that's enough.

24 MR. RUMLEY: Thank you, Don. Do you
25 have any questions? It's pretty well

1 self-explanatory. Thank you, Don. I appreciate
2 that.

3 At this time I need a motion to accept,
4 approve the monthly financial report presented by
5 Mr. Townsend. Do I hear a motion?

6 MR. GOFF: I make a motion we approve
7 the financial report as read by the clerk.

8 MR. RUMLEY: Okay. Do I have a second?

9 MR. PITTMAN: Second.

10 MR. RUMLEY: I'll call a vote.
11 Mr. Cervelli?

12 MR. CERVELLI: Yes.

13 MR. RUMLEY: Mr. Goff?

14 MR. GOFF: Yes.

15 MR. RUMLEY: Mr. Pittman?

16 MR. PITTMAN: Yes.

17 MR. RUMLEY: Mr. Smith?

18 MR. SMITH: Yes.

19 MR. RUMLEY: The chair votes yes.
20 Thank you. Robin, have you got anything that you
21 want to talk to us about?

22 MR. ROGERS: I do not.

23 MR. RUMLEY: Any legal matters? Okay.
24 Unfinished business?

25 MR. CERVELLI: Consent agenda.

1 MR. RUMLEY: Do what, Peter?

2 MR. CERVELLI: Consent agenda.

3 MR. RUMLEY: I'm going to get him to
4 read it. Don, do you want to go over the consent
5 agenda, please?

6 MR. TOWNSEND: Approval of the consent
7 agenda in the workshop is the approval of previous
8 meeting minutes, an agreement for change to
9 agreement for services with S&ME at Back Valley Road
10 landfill, the agreement for a lease agreement with
11 Georgia Forestry Commission, Resolution for E-911
12 surcharge on prepaid wireless services and Ordinance
13 09-01 -- actually, I correct that. It's Ordinance
14 number 08-04-11, amendment to Ordinance number
15 04-07-11(a), sale and distribution of methadone. I
16 believe that's it.

17 MR. RUMLEY: Okay. Any questions? Any
18 corrections that you need to make? If not, I'll
19 entertain a motion to approve our consent agenda as
20 presented. Do I hear a motion?

21 MR. PITTMAN: I'll make a motion we
22 approve the consent agenda as presented.

23 MR. RUMLEY: Do I have a second?

24 MR. SMITH: Second.

25 MR. RUMLEY: I'll call a vote. Mr.

1 Cervelli?

2 MR. CERVELLI: Yes.

3 MR. RUMLEY: Mr. Goff?

4 MR. GOFF: Yes.

5 MR. RUMLEY: Mr. Pittman.

6 MR. PITTMAN: Yes.

7 MR. RUMLEY: Mr. Smith?

8 MR. SMITH: Yes.

9 MR. RUMLEY: The chair votes yes.

10 Okay. Move down to number eight, does anyone got
11 anything else they want to say to us? You're
12 welcome to. You've got five minutes. You're
13 welcome to come up and talk to us.

14 UNIDENTIFIED CITIZEN: I just want to
15 say our frustration is with the road. I just didn't
16 want anybody to perceive it as any personal attacks
17 or anything. It wasn't meant to be that way. It
18 was just taxpaying citizens coming to the County for
19 some assistance. Nothing more, nothing less.

20 MR. RUMLEY: We understand that. Okay.
21 If there's nothing further, I'll entertain a motion
22 to adjourn.

23 MR. SMITH: Motion to adjourn.

24 MR. RUMLEY: Okay. Do I have a second?

25 MR. GOFF: Second.

1 MR. RUMLEY: Okay. All in favor, say
2 aye.
